1. Project Summary

“The toughest thing about success is that you’ve got to keep on being a success” – Irving Berlin

Many successes have been brought to the Hall Carter James subdivision of Fellsmere; however, that fact will not dim our focus of continuing to solve issues and executing action plans in the community. This idea was stressed by Steering Committee member Reverend Childress during the month’s community meeting. He emphasized to the residents that they need to continue their participation in the community meetings and that their involvement is just as integral as is ours. Reverend Childress’ comments were prompted by many of the residents showing up late to the community meeting. We hope and need for the community to stay involved in their own progress.

The Steering Committee met in January for the purpose of reporting progress on action plans. A top community identified issue for the community is transportation. Because of PACE, two roads that lie in the project area were improved from hazardous to sufficient conditions. A prior meeting with the Public Works Director generated action by the County to improve the two roads. Now the roads are much easier to travel on, especially in times of heavy rain. For many years the roads were impassable due to poor drainage and flooding, but now are 100% dry!

A second transportation issue has come to our attention. Parents of the community are concerned about the safety of their elementary school children and want the school bus to pick up the children at State Street at Grant Park. The current bus stop is on Willow Street, a much busier road and one that does not provide protection against rain or traffic. Although there has been resistance from the Indian River County School District to change the bus route, the middle school and high school students are picked up from the State Street location, providing a justifiable argument that should provoke change for the elementary school students.

Housing is another community identified issue that the Steering Committee is motivated to improve. Bonnie Heck, the Community Liaison, was tasked with researching housing grants that residents could apply for assistance. Mrs. Heck did a great job and came to the meeting with an abundance of knowledge in housing grants as they apply to Hall Carter James. In addition to Mrs. Heck’s work, Habitat for Humanity began their construction of a community adjacent to the Hall Carter James subdivision. We hope that we can help some residents take advantage of the housing that will become available by Habitat for Humanity and/or apply for grants as they apply to their situation.

Lack of business opportunity is a community identified issue that has seen some progress. The community store called “Granny’s” received CRA money for façade improvements a couple of months ago. Bids were put in from various companies to use the \$5,000 awarded by the CRA committee to improve the store. The money was allocated at a City Council meeting in which community residents showed up to show their support for Granny’s Store and for the PACE project.

Polly Coe, a member of the Steering Committee also announced some progress she accomplished. Mrs. Coe is part of the Fellsmere Beautification Committee and cares much about the aesthetics of a community. She established Saturday, April 26th, as a clean-up day for the Hall Carter James subdivision and Fellsmere. This should turn out to be another empowering day in which the residents take action in improving their own community.
