PHYSICAL HEALTH SURVEY FINDINGS REQUIRING OHS INTERVENTION

In addition to the physical health findings of Sumter Correctional Institution referenced in the main body of the survey report (which fall within the scope of the institutional staff to correct), several other areas of concern were noted. These findings may be based on standards adopted by the CMA, but not addressed in OHS policy, procedure, or directive, or on other issues beyond institutional control. Therefore, corrective actions at the institutional level can be initiated only by or with the authority or intervention of the OHS.

The items listed below identify the finding, the name of the audit instrument used by CMA surveyors and the specific screen number, if applicable, and what criteria were used to determine the standard was not met.

PHYSICAL HEALTH

1. **Oral cavity checks by a security officer were not routinely conducted during medication administration time (pill lines).** It was reported that checks are done only on known non-compliant inmates. (Referenced in CMA Medication Administration Systems Review Instrument, Screen 15)
2. **No policy exists which permits offering inmates in administrative or disciplinary confinement or protective management one hour of exercise per day, outside the cell, five days per week.** (Referenced in CMA Administrative Systems Review Instrument, Screen 23)

MENTAL HEALTH

There were no mental health findings identified during the survey that require intervention by the Office of Health Services.
