Note: Different Scale for Syphilis

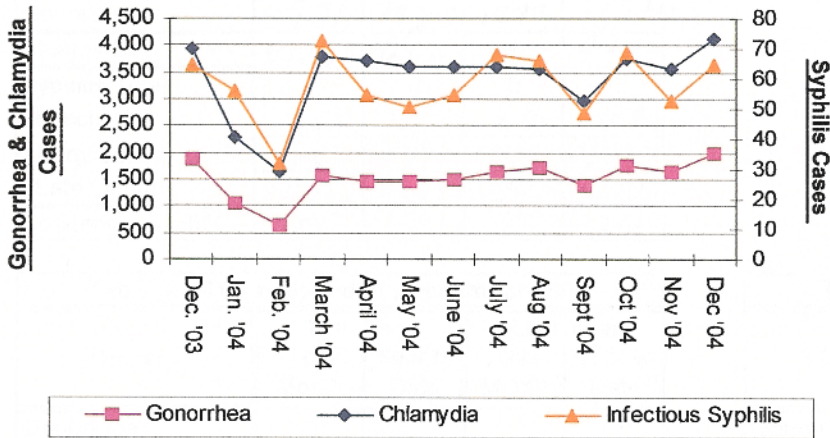
